4 Essential Elements of Positive Youth Development & How They Are Presented

1. Belonging: Key Details of Belonging Include	2. Mastery: Key Details of Mastery Include
 A Positive Relationship with a Caring Adult – this is present when: Volunteers give clear guidance & support while allowing youth to learn, grow, & lead. Youth take on new age-level appropriate challenges, knowing that adults are available to answer questions & guide them. An Inclusive Environment – this is present when: Adults are flexible to changing how things are done to include each young person. Youth have opportunities to understand & share their own identity in a safe space. Adults model acceptance & humility. Youth feel safe expressing themselves & learning about others. A Safe Environment – this is present when: Adults are aware of the risks & have taken steps to prevent or minimize those risks. Adults communicate expectations that will keep all youth participants safe. Youth & adults commit to building an environment of respect & inclusion. 	 Opportunity for Mastery – this is present when: Members grow in projects that capture their interest. Youth eventually assist or mentor others in the same interest area or skill. Youth demonstrate what they have learned & the skill they have developed. Engagement in Learning – this is present when: Members of various ages, backgrounds, & abilities do community service projects. Members work together, plan activities, & enjoy participating in learning activities. Members grow & mature as they plan & lead organizational activities & events. Members choose to become leaders of the group.
 Independence: Key Details of Independence Include Opportunity to See Oneself as an Active Participant in the Future – this is present when: Youth follow their interests to help choose possible hobbies & career paths. Members look forward to being leaders in the organization or group. Youth make plans for the coming year. The club shares excitement about a future activity or opportunity. Opportunity for Self-Determination – this is present when: Youth choose to participate in (or not participate in) projects, activities, or hobbies. Youth consider for themselves, "What went well? What would I do differently the next time?" Youth take on leadership & partnership roles to choose & plan activities, team events, & projects. 	 4. Generosity: Key Details of Generosity Include Opportunity to Value and Practice Service to Others – this is present when: Youth joyfully serve others through community improvement projects. Youth show mutual support for others within the organization. Youth can identify community needs & design solutions to meet those needs.
